Semester Reflection

With the start of the second semester near, the School District of New London is readied for learning opportunities that support fresh ideas, positive change, and enhanced learning experiences for all children. At the beginning of the academic year I encouraged parent/guardians to effectively communicate with their children and be involved with learning endeavors. To further support student success as we near the beginning of our second semester, give reflection on two basic themes referenced by *"Home and School Connection"* that will support "Success For All Students":

- Excellent Attendance: Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours. If your child asks to stay home "just because," remind them they will be missing a day of instruction that will mean extra effort to get caught up. Explain that they can be absent only if they are truly sick or if there is a family emergency.
- Solving Problems: Help your child make a list of strategies they can use when they get stuck. Simple ideas such as rereading a paragraph to better understand content and calling a friend for perspective may be all that is needed to solve homework problems. Even more appropriate write problems down and share it with their classroom teacher the next day.



As we begin the second semester of instruction on January 20, I encourage students

and parents/guardians to embrace the educational opportunities that will arise. The School District of New London is committed to learning environments that exemplify "Success For All Students."

Property Taxes

The district office and board members often receive feedback once property tax bills are received.

Below is a good summary of what the Board approved.



- The Board approved the levy in October with a 21 cent increase or 3.1% per \$1,000 of property value. Thus, the average taxpayer will see a 3.1% increase in school taxes.
- The total tax levy increase was 6.5%. The • mill rate is the most common way taxes are communicated, while the total levy is the overall dollar increase from the prior year.
- The primary increase in the mill rate and levy was not because of the 2018 referendum. The Board levied an additional \$470.000 because New London qualified as a low spending district. That amount was budgeted for maintenance projects.
- This additional amount spent does not • receive state aid until the next budget year. The Board will have similar authority in next year's budget, too.
- 2018 Mill Rate = \$7.73, 2019 Mill Rate = \$7.94
- In the last two years, the mill rate has been below \$8.00 per \$1,000, lowest since 2006. The state average is \$9.37 per thousand of taxable property.

Sometimes equalized property valuations change significantly in local municipalities creating an increase/decrease different than what was approved by the Board. This creates confusion that is different than our general communication.

<u>Milwaukee Public School District Referendum</u> (MPS)

MPS has a \$87 million referendum on the April ballot for consideration by voters. Why does this matter to New London?

MPS receives approximately \$551 million in state equalization aid each year. This equates to about about ³/₃ of the MPS' revenue for revenue limit purposes. This is about 11% of the State of Wisconsin's appropriation for general equalization aid. If the referendum passes, it will impact all school districts that receive state aid. Other school districts pass referendums as well and it has an impact, but since MPS is so large, the impact is more noticeable.

The less state aid we receive, the more local property taxes are needed to offset the decrease in state aid. I will keep the Board posted as we know more because the impact would not be felt until the 2021-22 budget.

Child Development Days

Our final child development day screening is scheduled for Friday, January 24, 2020 from 1:00-6:00 p.m., at Lincoln Elementary School. This developmental screening is designed for children 21/2 to 4 years old. The screening process allows children to separate from their parents to participate in a play-based screening to observe speech/language, cognition, gross and fine motor, and self-help skills. During the screening, parents are able to chat with our elementary principals and then directed to our community area to speak with our school nurse, 4K staff, and gather resources from the public library and other community partners. ACCESS Testing



Federal and state laws require that students identified as English Learners (ELs) be assessed annually to determine

their level of English language proficiency (ELP) and ensure that they are progressing in achieving full English proficiency. This includes students who receive special education services.

The ACCESS assessment window is December 2, 2019-January 31, 2020. The School District of New London has over 100 students taking the ACCESS assessment. At this time, our district is over 70% complete with testing. Our bilingual teachers and tutors complete this testing with our students.

Program Donation for High School Special Education

Jill Spencer's classroom in the high school received a donation of \$1,000 from Craig and Jodi Benzel. The donation was directed to be put forth for use in the high school special education program for student needs and student opportunities.
