provide easy access to mental health support for our students and families.

These agencies have the opportunity to be physically present to offer their therapy services during the school day on our campus to allow for easy access to mental health care. Students are able to attend appointments during the school day, without their parents needing to take off of work to transport them. This helps eliminate the barrier to accessing mental health care services for our families and provides convenience for access.

August Inservice

During and prior to the August inservice, all the district staff were able to participate in trainings related to Safety Training. These include Bloodborne Pathogen Training, Mandatory Reporting, CPR, Medication Administration and Epi-Pen and Glucagon Training. The November 13, 2023, inservice will also be a full 8 hour day of training sessions related to safety.

September Enrollment Data



September 15, 2023 is the state "third Friday" date for data snapshot to be secured. That enrollment data serves to calculate

funding and impacts state and federal reporting. As with any year, we have had our share of new students, last minute transfers, and are active in asserting our enrollment data is accurate. Please continue to encourage community members to have families share residential changes and potential enrollments as soon as possible. Lesley Baehman, building secretaries, counselors and specialists continue to follow up on students to assure they are transferred or enrolled appropriately. At the time of this report, online enrollment percentage was much improved from last year. This is a celebration of their efforts.

Learning and Achievement Data

State assessment results were sent home to families during open house and will be sent or mailed home to those who did not attend. Results, averages and state comparisons are under embargo and cannot be discussed, but individual scores are helping address student needs at the start of the year. We



will have more of that data released in October and November for the state accountability reports.

- New interventions


Local data being collected includes beginning of the year baseline data.

With the added work on implementation and planning by staff on our implementation team, feedback was gathered to guide our goals for this year. Title IA

This year we continue to qualify for Title IA grant funding for supplemental programming in Reading and Math. These efforts include using spring data to



determine needs and set goals for the following year to close the gap in reading and math achievement.

The district Title I page has been updated and has copies of each school wide plan for our elementary schools and other information related to Title services.

Our district team go beyond what is required by teaching and modeling reading strategies to promote engagement and achievement.

This year, the elementary team modeled the use of ortho graphic mapping and unified language for letter formation in the early years. The ISMS team is aligning their efforts including grammar posters to hold high expectations for quality written work. At the high school Jacqueline Schommer, Lindsey Uvaas and Joanna Ledgerood hosted a session with age appropriate reading strategies for all courses.
